Hiram Brinson Memorial Award cover sheet

Hiram Brinson was an icon not only in Duplin County but, in the state level of Rescue/EMS as well. Hiram began the EMS service in Duplin county in 1970 serving as the EMS Director and Fire Marshall until 1997. Hiram was very active not only locally, but in the state level of EMS as well. He demonstrated selfless service through the following organizations: NC Fire/Rescue Commission (1995-2003), NC Civil Defense Association later Emergency Management Association (1970-1997); President of the NC Civil Defense Association (1975-1976); NC Association of Rescue & EMS (1985-2003); Area Director (1985-1991); Vice Commander of NC Association of Rescue & EMS (1991-1993); Commander of NC Association of Rescue & EMS (1994-1995); Chairman EMS committee of the Neuse River Council of Government/East Carolina Council of Government (1994-2003).

Many across the state saw Hiram as a vivacious leader who had a vision of ways to lead Rescue/ EMS to where it is today. Hiram's outgoing personality masked the many physical challenges he had to deal with during his life time. Hiram's vision limitations did not stop him from traversing the state. His children, son Davis and daughter Amy, as well as friends chauffeured him from Manteo to Murphy. Vision impairments, Brights Disease, a stroke and cancer finally claimed his life all to soon at age 56.

Hiram was very passionate about his family, Duplin County and the state of North Carolina. It is our desire that the legacy Hiram Brinson started should never be forgotten. His personal journey is an inspiration to all of us in rescue and EMS. This award serves to honor an individual who has shown tremendous strength and courage as Hiram did.
